BUSY STREETS IN PIERSON PLACE:

Repair and maintenance assistance: Phoenix residents may qualify for repair services with the city's Utility Repair and Replacement Program which provides emergency services to low income households. Service could include repairing water heaters, ac units, stoves, refrigerators, evap coolers, furnaces, and some minor plumbing problems. Applicants must own the home, and not have received services from the program within 12 months prior. To learn more about this program call 602-262-4520

Cars will only be able to exit onto 7th Ave, and not be able to turn into the neighborhood from 7th Ave. The Medlock neighborhood north of us has this. Do you have ideas?
