

Support Your Police!

The city recently approved the 2021-2022 fiscal budget, and it contained some changes in the police budget. It allocated \$15 million to expand the Community Assistance Program, which is a civilian-only program that responds to mental and behavioral health calls.

It also provided \$3.7 million to the police department to add 75 civilian staff to "improve accountability, transparency and relationships with the community." These positions are intended to improve public records requests and ways to identify trends in employees' adverse actions.

An additional \$500,000 was added for police reform to improve community trust. A comprehensive department review will look at policies and practices and include community feedback.

These things are in addition to a \$43 million increase for the Police Department, which now has a budget of about \$786 million a year.

Please remember how the police work day and night to keep us safe. They put their lives on the line when they are at work, and we salute them!

Even with record temps pounding down, Pierson Place is flying high on the cool meter. We pulled off some great projects in the midst of Covid, albeit with twists and turns, but always with the best intentions. It's the people who volunteer their time that make all the difference in the world, and you can see their projects all throughout this edition.

The amount of work that some people do is amazing. We started a list of "Accomplishments" back in 2004, and it was a half-page long. It has been updated yearly, and now it is two pages long in single-spaced format! It dates back to training Block Watch captains, getting speed humps, conducting surveys, distributing locking mailboxes, creating an identity, building monuments, and of course... tons of projects that reduce crime. An updated list comes out this fall.

And speaking of crime, we hope you noticed the rise in crime that we are seeing now. If not, please look at the "Crime Stats" section on page 4, and pay close attention to Henry Harding's "Summary" message at the end. The current level of crime in and around our neighborhood is alarming. No doubt a lot of it originates at the Light Rail stations on three of our corners. But regardless of where it comes from, all of it is bad, and all of it is screaming out for us to "get involved".

We can do little things that help in big ways. Like, 1.) call the cops when you see anything suspicious. Even when you think it is a "maybe", call the cops. We are their eyes and ears when they are not here. 2.) Jot down descriptions of people and things that are suspicious before you call in. 3.) Take a picture if is safe to do so. 4.) Make sure your patio and door and cameras are working properly and aimed in the right direction. 5.) Put a Block Watch sign in your yard to let the bad guys know you are diligent about crime. 6.) Make sure back-yard and alley lighting is working properly, motion sensors are working, and timers on lights are set correctly. 7.) Lock your windows. 8.) Lock your gates. 9.) Lock your cars. 10.) Don't leave valuables in plain sight. Even small efforts will help reduce crime.

If everyone did these ten things, the bad guys would get the hint and move on. We have had spikes in crime before, and the pattern is usually the same. We get lax, and they get bold. We ramp up, and they split. Now is the time to ramp up. Show them this is not a good neighborhood for doing crime. We can do it. Just remember that everyone can do amazing work and "accomplish" a lot, ...and also know your neighbors are counting on you.


Yard Sale With Carnation

The Neighborhood Services Department has several housing reha-bilitation programs Phoenix residents can participate in to improve the health and safety of their homes. For instance, the Lead Safe Phoenix Program protects pregnant women and young children by remediating the dangers of lead poisoning and exposure, while the Weatherization Assistance Program reduces utility bills by mak-ing homes more energy efficient. The Owner-Occupied Housing Rehabilitation Program, on the other hand, can be used to com-plete critical repairs regarding plumbing, roofs, heating and cooling, and electrical systems. While all of these programs have different eligibility requirements, they are typically designed to aid and support Phoenix households with low- and moderate-incomes, which means earning a maximum of \$55,300 a year for a family of four. Summary


In Pierson Place we had 2 assaults on the east end of Mariposa, one with a weapon, the other impeded the victim's breathing. A third assault was at 3rd Ave and Hazelwood, near the entrance to the Grand Canalscape. There were 8 crimes in the last three months ending June 1st. So, an up-turn in violent crime was reported, but all were in April. However overall, crime still is generally elevated. So when out in the neighborhood be aware of your surroundings and be a bit more reticent with people who concern you. These past months have been strenuous on people in general, so be more wary. Central Ave had much more crime and personal crime with 2 sexual assaults and an aggravated assault. Central had more crime than before and it is more violent now, with 2 sexual assaults and one aggravated assault.

7th Ave and Camelback was the most crime ridden intersection this month with 12 total crimes that were as violent as our neighborhood crime. 19th Ave and Camelback remains the most violent of all intersections but with less total crimes overall. 7th Ave had 12, and 15th Ave had 6, although one was a rape.

People have been in a stress mode for a fair amount of time with the pandemic and lethal disease concerns. So get your shots, use your mask, and try to minimize vulnerability to Covid and Crime.




