Crime Prevention at Home

Walk around the exterior of your home and scout out its weaknesses. The best way to protect your home from the outside is to survey it with the eyes of a burglar. If you can easily tell that a window could be pried open, a thief can definitely come to the same conclusion. You can even ask the police department to provide a courtesy home assessment that can help you identify your home's weak spots.

While you're checking for vulnerable spots, take note of any expensive electronics, art, or furniture that is easily spotted through windows. You don't have to redecorate your entire home to keep expensive items out of sight, but it doesn't hurt to make small adjustments where you can. No need to tempt thieves any more than you have to!


<u>Keep shrubbery around entrances and</u>
<u>walkways trimmed.</u> The last thing you want is to make it easier for a thief to hide when

attempting to break in, so eliminate his options for hiding spots. He may only need a few minutes of cover to make his entry but with no place to hide while doing it, he's less likely to even try. You could even plant thorny shrubs by your windows to make it not only difficult to break in, but painful!

Install motion sensor lighting around your home, especially at entrances. Shine a spotlight on a potential intruder before he can even touch your doors or windows by adding extra lighting with motion detectors at entrances and especially dark corners of your home. If you live in an apartment, ask your landlord to install sufficient lighting in walkways and halls to eliminate dark corners.

Get to know your neighbors. Crime tends to be lower in tight-knit communities because neighbors are more likely to look out for each other and can easily spot a stranger. Your neighbors can be one of your best assets in home crime prevention because they offer extra eyes and an outside perspective. Plus if they have a different work or school schedule from yours, they might be around during the day when you're away and can alert you to any suspicious activity that may occur in your absence.

Get Safe, Be Safe!

One of the most important things you can do to reduce crime in YOUR neighborhood is to protect YOUR house.

Add a driveway alarm on your driveway or the front porch, so you know when someone is approaching your door. Add timers on some lamps, and bad guys will think someone is home and pass you by. Put solar motion lights in your yards and know when someone is there. Install deadbolts on exterior doors, garages and guest houses, and make it too hard for bad guys to get in.

Along with those things, you might as well put a metal Block Watch sign in your yard and let the bad guys know that someone will call the cops on them.

Learn Your Neighbors Names

This is Good Neighboring 101 but you'd be surprised how many people have lived next to someone for years and don't know the first thing about them. Good neighbors will make the little extra effort to learn their neighbors' names and a few things about their lives, like how long they've lived in the area, where they work, or if they have kids or pets, Tsai says. The payoff can be great. It will make you feel more connected to those around you but it can also help make your neighborhood safer neighbors who know each other are more likely to watch out for each other. One of the best defenses against a home break-in is a neighbor who knows your schedule and notices something out of the ordinary.

Smile And Wave

Thanks to the Internet we're interacting with people around the world more than ever but that may mean we're also interacting much less with the people right next door to us. Fortunately, it doesn't take much to change that, says Bonnie Tsai, founder and director of Beyond Etiquette. "A smile, a wave, a brief exchange of pleasantries, can inspire a lot of

goodwill with your neighbors," she says. It doesn't take much and makes the neighborhood a much happier place overall.

Help Your Neighbors

Does your elderly neighbor have an unkempt yard? Does the single mom next door always leave her garbage cans out? Are the kids unruly at the bus stop?
